Southerners are no strangers to hospitality, and just across the state border Jackson County shares with Tennessee, our neighbors in the town of Monteagle provide that familiar, warm welcome.

A beautiful, scenic drive from Scottsboro, traveling though Stevenson and Bridgeport crossing into South Pittsburg. Tenn., plus a short route along Interstate 24 will lead you to a place full of captivating nature, locallyowned shops and rustic cabin lodging. Settled on Monteagle Mountain is the home of this Southern hospitality at its best. Rooting in family legacy since 1960, what started as a small wooden cabin built from the ground up has grown into its own little weekend getaway known as Jim Oliver's Smoke House Restaurant and Lodge.

Customers from all over the world have come and gone through the doors of Jim Oliver's to sample delicious Southern cooking inspired by generations of recipes. >>







Jim, at only twenty-one years old, started building a reputation for his cooking at a place he rented called the Bee-Hive Drive-In. Including a staff of two employees and curb service, the restaurant welcomed locals to gather while dining in the parking lot. The Bee-Hive thrived just enough for Jim to purchase a historic landmark restaurant just down the street and his business continued to grow. Fast forward to 1975, after dedicated months of labor and construction, Jim finally opened the doors to the Smoke House. Employing 14 people, with 50 seats for dining and a menu full of family recipes handed down from generations of Oliver cooks, Jim Oliver's Restaurant started a tradition featuring smoke house style meats.

Although Jim passed away in 2007,

his legacy continues through the passion and magnanimity of his family, especially his son James David Oliver and daughter Betsy. Now with over 70 employees, more than 500 seats for dining and a 10,000 square foot general store, the historic restaurant continues to flourish. In addition to the restaurant, Jim Oliver's offers an 85-room lodge and 23 rustic log cabins featuring fireplaces, jacuzzi tubs and everything needed to create a wonderful mountain vacation experience.

"We offer good home style cooking, served by friendly folks, everyday," says James David.

"Our restaurant is complete with waitress service, a full menu and an allyou-can-eat self serve food bar with all of the fixings." The Smoke House is the best of both worlds with generations of recipes of mom and pop cooking, and enough space to serve groups up to 1,000 people. The restaurant is dedicated to its patrons, opening their doors every day of the year. September through May, dining is open from 6:30 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and until 10:00 p.m. Friday and Saturday. During the months of June through August, dining is available extended until 11 p.m. on Friday and Saturday.

Their specialties include country ham, Southern fried chicken and catfish, beef brisket, smoked ribs and pulled pork and the most appetizing fried green tomatoes. They offer a variety of Southern-cooking sides such as seasonal pinto beans, skillet cabbage, fried apples, slaw, fresh sliced tomatoes and cucumbers. Along the hot food bar a passed-down recipe of vegetable beef soup and warm, cast-iron skillet cornbread can be found.

Breakfast is served all day at Jim Oliver's. The breakfast menu includes a platter full of smoked country ham, eggs sunny side up (or however you prefer them), warm homemade biscuits or sourdough toast, grits and fresh-sliced tomatoes. Other breakfast specialties include the famously-delicious smoked bacon, sausage, pancakes and any-wayyou-want-them omelets.

A visit to Jim Oliver's is no time to skip dessert. Susan, "the pie lady" makes some of the best fried pies in the South. Made fresh every day, the pies come with the choice of six delectable fillings including peach, apple, chocolate, coconut, strawberry and cherry. Top them with homemade ice cream and warm caramel, and it is a treat for the ages. Another popular dessert is the famous Bread Pudding topped with a choice of homemade fruit toppings.

Stepping into the general store is like stepping back to "the good ole' days." An entire evening could be spent looking around at all of the antiques and old-fashioned and handmade goods. Homemade fudge in a variety of flavors, family-recipe crackers, popcorn and pork skins, traditional candy like swirling lollipops, Bit-O-Honey and salt water taffy can all be found throughout the store. Sweet tooths will be pleased during a stroll through the candy wonderland just inside the door.









Showcasing over twenty flavors of barbecue and hot sauces, from mild to extra hot, there is a flavor for everyone. There is also a variety of salad dressings, fruit toppings, ketchups, mustards and meat rubs. Guest are welcome to sample any of the condiments during their time at the Smoke House. Full bottles are also available for purchase in the store.

Smoking meat is a specialty of "Smokin' Man Mike," the restaurants meat and rub guru. Stop by the counter where Mike has samples of what he is cooking on the smoker that day.

Sample the meats, rubs and sauces all before sitting down to order.


Walking deeper into the general store, unique finds can be discovered around each corner. The wooden shelves showcase crafts, handmade soaps, candles, personal care products, family-recipe jams, jellies and pickles. There is plenty to explore while a 1920 player piano produces tunes for enjoyment. Spotted on the walls are pieces of history such as vintage baseball jerseys and gloves, old-fashioned coke bottles, and sepia-toned photos each telling their own story.



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Displayed on a wall of one of the dining areas hangs a large black and white photo which holds a special place in James David's heart.

"This is a photo of my grandfather," says James David.

His grandfather is pictured sitting next to a cousin who was to be a groom during the upcoming hours of when the photo was taken. Details show worn-in work boots and clothing dating back to the 1930s.

"It's a funny story, because if you look close enough you can see my grandfather's cousin has a black eye," he laughs.

"They had just gotten into a fight, on his wedding day."

Luckily the story has a happy ending, as the cousins made up just in time to have a photo snapped. In the photo the young men are sitting on a

mule in which the newlyweds used for their farewell ride after the wedding.

Next to that photo hangs another cherished photo showing a young Jim Oliver discussing the Smoke House with a journalist from Chattanooga's Times Free Press.

In addition to the restaurant and lodging, the site has a 20 acre recreational campus featuring a pool, pond, pavilion with picnic tables, wooden porch swings and a kid's zone furnished with fun games and activities for all ages. Bicycle and fishing pole rentals are also available.

"Dad never was satisfied with standing still, so he created a business that could cater not only to local folks, but also travelers," says James David.







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

The Smoke House also offers a 5,000 square foot conference center to accommodate meetings and reunions. The center can also be known as The Music Room on Friday and Saturday nights, where the restaurant serves a full menu and drinks during live shows. The recurring event is called Monteagle Mountain Music.

Each weekend, the Smoke House opens up its doors to the music room allowing singer-songwriters and a variety of musicians to take the stage. The event is free to attend and is family-friendly. The music series features many up-and-coming artist out of Nashville, USA's "Music City."

Inside a the music room, cabaret style seating invites guests as cozy, radiant candlelight and twinkling fairy lights create a magical setting. Surrounded by music-related antiques from vintage microphones, to vinyl records and old instruments sits a small, colorfully-lit stage welcoming artist for an intimate performance. Genres of pop, blues, soul, bluegrass, folk, country and acoustic rock provide a unique show each weekend. Performers can talk to guests, telling them about lyrics they have written, stories about how they became writers and notes about their upcoming albums. Many famous songwriter, some who have written songs recorded by great artists such as Keith Urban, Hank Williams Jr. and Elton John, have stood on stage at Jim Oliver's.





THE LOVERS.

Cole Vosbury and Amanda June, a duo from Nashville know at The Lovers, showcase their talent during an intimate set in The Music Room at Jim Oliver's.

Surrounded by the warm glow of candlelight and the magical vibes of the stage lights, the duo's soulful, harmonizing voices fill the room.

Vosbury, originally from Shreveport, Louisiana, discovered his love for music at a young age. Growing up with a musical family, he found influence through church, playing drums, learning piano and, at age 13, fell in love with playing guitar.

He went on to perform on season five of NBC's hit television show, The Voice, which took him to the top four on Blake Shelton's team. He then decided to lay roots in Nashville and begin traveling around the country writing and performing music.

One night in Franklin, Tenn. at a place called Puckett's Boat House, he heard an alluring voice coming from the stage. This is when he first set eyes on Amanda June.

"I just had to go up and introduce myself," says Vosbury.

Amanda June, originally from Dayton, Ohio, set out at the age of 18 to pursue a career as a singer-songwriter. She knew Nashville was where she needed to be, and followed her passion to develop herself as an artist. Through a friend and fellow singer, Walker Hayes, June started to perform on stage at Puckett's Boat House during songwriter sessions.

After meeting Vosbury, the two were naturally drawn to each other. They started performing together on a regular basis and wrote their first song together called "Pieces."

In 2016, The Lovers officially formed, mending together voices

to create seamless sounds of blues, folk and rock.

As a duo they draw inspiration from Stevie Nicks and Tom Petty. Personally, Vosbury loves Chris Stapleton, Michael Jackson and Bruno Mars. But ultimately they are influenced by all genres of music.

"We want to make a good, well-rounded album," says June.

Playing drums, piano, bass and guitar, Vosbury produces all of The Lovers recordings.

At the moment, Vosbury and June are working on their first studio album. In addition to covers, the duo performs originals on stage. They also enjoy singing several songs written by their friend, Dave Pahanish, who first led them to Jim Oliver's Music on the Mountain.

Pahanish, a singer-songwriter who has written hits for artist such as Toby Keith, Tim McGraw and Keith Urban, also occasionally performs at the Smoke House.

As Jim Oliver's nears its thousand-show mark, organizer Marla Sitten, continues to bring hit songwriters and aspiring artists to Music on the Mountain.

"This place has become a muse for singer-song writers and it's just a very healing place and just a cool place to hang out," says Sitten.

"After being in the music business for twenty years, I can truly say these shows can stand up to anything you would see in Nashville, Tennessee.

It's just been a wonderful experience working with JD Oliver to create a place for these artist to showcase their talents, and allow music-lovers to come out and enjoy a free show."









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


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The first episode of Bluegrass Underground, featuring The SteelDrivers, aired 10 years ago.
